Dear Town Board and Planning Board Members:

This requests the Boards' response to the commercial development, Black Brook Barn, 143 Forestburgh Road, built in a residential zoned area.

I was informed by town officials that this development was planned, built, completed, and is operational, without any prior submissions to or approval by the town. Large events are occurring.

While certain commercial uses can be permitted in the RR1 district, town regulations require application for and issuance of a special use permit and associated site plan approval.

I was further informed by the Planning Board that the town is required to hear and consider public input, and that there would be a formal public hearing scheduled and the information would be available on the town website.

Mr. Hogue informed me three months ago that the town attorney and building inspector had been notified and violations were likely pending. I have no further information, despite requests, and do not see anything on the town website, regarding this matter. Please correct me if I have missed it.

We are in no judgment of the development itself. We support appropriate economic development in our area, when and if it adheres to town compliance and zoning regulations. Our concern is the blatant disregard of town rules.

The Boards have done excellent work on zoning and development regulations. It sets a dangerous precedent if they are waived for one but not another, particularly if the one waived or given a minor slap on the wrist is involved in town leadership. What's to stop the next developer from doing the same and claiming discrimination if challenged?

We trust the Boards to execute town regulations in the interest of a lawfully protected and cohesive community. We hereby request that the Board provides information on the website that details actions taken, and demonstrates current compliance with stated town regulations and codes.

#### **Project Description and Action**

The Town of Forestburgh ("Town") Town Board seeks to amend the Town Code by adding a chapter establishing regulations applicable to the installation of solar energy facilities (the "Action") The local law entitled "Solar Energy Systems" ("SES") is attached as Appendix 1.

The SES regulation is a generally applicable local law and is adopted under Article IX of the New York State Constitution, New York Municipal Home Rule Law § 10, New York Statute of Local Governments § 10, and New York Town Law §§ 261-263.

#### Reasons Supporting the Determination

The Town Board evaluated all 11 questions in the SEAF Part 2 and did not identify any moderate to large impacts that would result as a result of the Action.

The SES local law provides standards to facilitate the development and operation of solar energy systems in the Town of Forestburgh, subject to a land use permitting process and other reasonable conditions that will protect the public health, safety and welfare, and the environment. The SES local law establishes regulations for SES less than 25 kilowatt ("KW") ("Small-Scale") and for SES greater than 25 KW ("Large Scale").

The Small-Scale systems include roof-mounted, ground-mounted, and building integrated solar panels. Small Scale systems are allowed in all zoning districts as an accessory use but must comply with the NYS Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code ("Building Code"), NYSERDA, the NYS Energy Conservation Code ("Energy Code"). Roof-mounted and building integrated solar panels require building permits. Ground-mounted Small-Scale Systems require site plan approval and are subject to the requirements in § 134-14, which are intended to avoid or mitigation and environmental impact.

Large-Scale systems are only allowed in the Recreational Residential and Rural Conservation zoning districts requiring site plan approval, special use permit, and are subject to the requirements and strict land-use controls set forth in § 134-15, including treatment as a SEQRA Type I action (§ 134-15 [B] [12]).

The SES regulations are consistent with the goals of the Comprehensive Plan to conserve the quality and quantity of natural, historic and scenic resources for the use and enjoyment of all residents by preserving the visual quality of the Town as viewed from its highways and by protecting important wildlife habitats.

Based on the foregoing and on the administrative record as a whole, the adoption of the SES local law will not result in any of the impacts identified in § 617.7 (c) (1). All potential impacts identified in the Part 2 SEAF and in § 617.7 (c) (1) were considered and found to be not relevant, not significant, or would otherwise be avoided and mitigated by the land use restrictions and requirements incorporated SES local law. Impacts from such uses are avoided or mitigated by the applicable bulk area standards that require appropriate lot sizes and setback, and any specific impacts from future development would be controlled by the planning Board during the site plan and/or special use permit application process.

Upon review of the information set forth in the administrative record, and considering both the magnitude and importance of each identified potential impact, it is the conclusion of the Town Board of the Town of Forestburgh, as lead agency that, this Action will result in no significant adverse impacts on the environment, and, therefore, an environmental impact statement need not be prepared.

Accordingly, this NEGATIVE DECLARATION is issued.
